conclusion his time as our vouth pastor. our leader gave youth each blessing. parting The blessing he gave me was a homemade plaque with Silly Putty mounted to a block

of stained wood. He wrote a scripture verse beneath the accidental amorphous toy once used as a tool on the Apollo 8 mission. It read:

"Do not be conformed to the patterns of this world but be transformed by the renewing of your mind." - Romans 12:2a

I think about that gift every so often, especially during the season of Epiphany. The Christian season of Epiphany covers the first two months of the year bridging the abundant joy of Christmas and the austere journey of Lent. Yet Epiphany is more than a middle ground, it is a time of insight, discovery, and inspiration.

It is easy to think of an epiphany as a spontaneous occurrence, a lightning bolt idea, or an unexpected revelation. However, in the Bible, epiphanies are built upon background work. During the season of Epiphany we retell three stories that reveal how the stage is set for the "renewing of mind."

The Visit of the Magi: The Magi did not accidentally stumble over Christ. The revelation of the Messiah came to the Magi because they had been studying ancient texts and they kept their eyes to the heavens. The Magi maintained their conviction that there was truth beyond their corner of the world. Their sudden insight and understanding was built upon the time they invested searching for understanding.

The Blessing of Anna and Simeon: When Mary and Joseph brought the infant Jesus to the temple

ust before the the baby was greeted and blessed by the prophet of Anna and Simeon. God had promised Simeon that he would see the consolation of Israel before he died. Anna and Simeon encountered Jesus and had insight into God's plan because they faithfully a worshipped God. They went to the temple daily and listened to the Holy Spirit's leading. Because of this they were ready to receive their epiphany.

> The Baptism of Jesus: When Jesus was baptized the Spirit of God descended and God proclaimed, "this is my beloved son in whom I am pleased." John the Baptist witnessed this epiphany because he consented to baptize Jesus. John was hesitant at first but he listened to Jesus guidance, followed his call, and was blessed with insight.

> We cannot force an epiphany but that does not mean we should be passive like Silly Putty waiting for external forces to shape us. We can be intentional and actively lay the ground work for Holy Spirit to transform our thinking and renew our perspective. Through cultivating a spirit of openness and curiosity; through study of the scriptures; through honest worship; through faithfulness to our call to serve and bless; through all of this and more we prepare ourselves to be utterly amazed by the Holy Spirit.

> This season of Epiphany let us be open to a new insight, a different perspective, a renewal of our thinking. Let us cultivate practices that prepare us to hear the Holy Spirit say, "Have you thought about this?" This season may we "be transformed by the renewing of our minds, so that we may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect."

One example occurs each week at Serving Aloha; we offer a prayer card for those who want to receive this blessing. Prayers have been written by Carolyn Winston and Evie Hao. Pixie St. Denis hands out the cards after quests have received their food. She shared that one quest said the food feeds his body, but the prayer card feeds his heart. Amen to that! What more can we as a church hope for, than to be a place of spiritual nourishment. The following prayer was written by Evie Hao and shared this past week. I hope these words speak to all our hearts and inspire our actions in this coming year.

Lord, We ask for your wisdom, for your strength and power to be constantly present within us. We pray you would make us strong and courageous for the road ahead. Give us ability beyond what we feel able, let your gifts flow freely through us, so that you would be honored by our lives. Amen Here are some notes from the Council this month:

Central Union Preschool is currently going through the Admissions process for the Preschool and Toddler program. CUPS has been working through the current COVID surge by staying in communication with preschool families, the Hawaii Department of Health and the Department of Human Services. CUPS is also working with the Buildings and Grounds Staff and Committee to address campus needs.

During Advent, our **Youth** partnered with Church of the Crossroads and Lana'i Union Church to host a 3-session online Advent activity for youth (based on A Christmas Carol) and in late December went on an outing to see Christmas lights. In January, there was an outing to Waimea Valley for a mālama 'āina service-learning activity. The youth also joined a larger community group on the MLK holiday. The vaccine clinic with Healthy Mothers Healthy Babies is scheduled for January 30 (after budget meeting) to hold a modified "parking fundraiser" in conjunction with modified Punahou Carnival on February 4.

The Women's League is thankful for the hiring of a permanent staff manager of the Honolulu Thrift Shop and especially thankful to Joan Murata for her leadership



and service as the Temporary Volunteer Thrift Shop Manager for over the past year. The Thrift Shop sustained damage during the December rainstorm. While repairs made earlier this year held, other concerns surfaced and are being addressed by the Buildings and Grounds staff and Committee.

**Central Union Windward** - Conversations are underway for a sister UCC congregation to share sanctuary and Sunday School space at Central Union Windward. The Thrift Shop has made a permanent move and now occupies the entire mauka wing, opening the Fellowship Hall to be used by other groups. The Thrift Shop has made donations to community organizations and is also donating clothing to CUW Food pantry clients that are in need. Regular supply minister, the Reverend Dr. Richard Walenta, was away on a trip to visit family during the Fall. During his absence, the following people filled the pulpit: Rev. Lauren Medeiros, Rev. Alpha Goto, Rebecca Woodland, Ken Harding, Rev. Brandon Duran and most recently Malia Galindo.

In January, Serving Aloha has averaged around 500 households served each week. The combination of walk up and drive through food distribution is working well. Volunteers are needed. There are usually between 40 and 50 volunteers participating each Wednesday, including church members, those from the community and other churches.

The Council has formed an Ad-hoc Fundraising Committee to generate and evaluate new ideas to enhance revenues. The committee has been charged to think "outside the box", to develop creative ideas, that also create opportunities to produce an effective return on investment.

### Youth Gather to Mālama 'Āina

arly morning on Monday, January 17th, a small group of high school youth and college students from Central Union made their way to Waimea Valley to join in service with dozens of others from the community. It was the day when we remember and honor the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (MLK). The day also marked 129 years since the illegal overthrow of the Hawaiian Kingdom.

In MLK's last Christmas sermon, he shared, "We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied to a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly." This concept of mutuality that MLK spoke of can be seen in our focus for the day: mālama 'āina, which Native Hawaiians live by, which we all must live by—we care for the land and the land cares for us. Indeed, it was a special day to be together and connect with the 'āina that has sustained us to the present.

"Spending the day with the breathtaking 'āina of Waimea Valley was definitely an experience I'll never forget. The opportunity to mālama our 'āina in one of the most sacred places, originally for the highest

kahuna, put into perspective how important the work we did was. Not only for the ecosystem there, but the cultural significance of where we were. Getting our hands dirty pulling

out and removing invasive species from the botanical gardens for hours was well worth it to see the falls at the end that left me in awe of how beautiful our home is. It is our responsibility to keep it that way."
