I closed my January 2021 Spire article in this way, "We step forward in faith, trusting that God has great things in store for Central Union Church. It's our 2021 resolution, to step boldly into the new creation that God has put before us." In this time of great uncertainty, I am more convinced than ever of the belief expressed in Ecclesiastes. This has been a year that started off with great promise as vaccinations became available; and yet we have seen the virus spike, recede, spike, recede



and spike again. I now pray that we are entering an endemic phase, a phrase that was totally foreign to me a year ago. What remains steadfast is our belief that there is beauty in God's creation, and that each day is a new creation full of opportunity. We have seen those opportunities blossom and grow in 2021 and we trust that God will continue to work at Central Union in 2022.

Here are some highlights from 2021: Central Union Preschool passed its NAEYC accreditation with flying colors and celebrated its 93rd birthday! Outreach continued as World Missions distributed Boxes of Hope in Beirut and Serving Aloha fed on average 450 to 500 households per week. The accounting firewall with Central Union Windward came down and service to the Windward community continued as a ministry of CUC. Our Diaconate, Senior Services and other volunteers found ways to connect with our elderly and/or frail members. The Vision Team created a vision Statement guide: "We are Stewards of God's blessing to Central Union Church and we shall move forward, in Faith, to expand those blessings in service to others." The congregation approved a restatement of the Bylaws, adopted Standing Rules and amendments to the Articles of Incorporation. Our Children's Ministry held a week-long Compassion Camp for our keiki. Our Pohnpeian Ministry provided service online that reached many in Pohnpei as well as returning to in-person service. We welcomed new staff as Dr. Jace Saplan joined as Director of Choirs, Devin Omura became our AV tech and Orlando Kehl joined the Buildings and Grounds staff serving the Windward and Honolulu campus. We developed our online services and held in-person worship adhering to safety protocols to keep our members safe. And this is just a sample of the many things that occurred throughout the year at our church.

The next order of business for our congregation will be the approval of the annual budget. Our Budget meeting will be held on January 30, 2022. We will be conducting a hybrid in-person and on-line meeting to try to accommodate as many members as possible. We require a quorum of 100 members to conduct business. Please make your attendance a priority for this very important meeting.

As we look ahead to 2022, my resolution echoes that of last year, that we boldly step into the new creation that God has put before us, trusting in God's Love that Never Fails.

So Now What...?

or the last few months we have shared our vision of intergenerational worship. And while I believe we have a solid foundation to transition to this new-old way of worshiping together, I know it will take some time and flexibility to fully live into the vision. Adjusting our Sunday school time to enable families to worship together, this very reality presents new challenges. As a parent, worshiping with a small child is a challenge! The concerns of parents and children alike are valid and real! Sitting through worship will be a new experience for many children and like all new experiences, it can be daunting. As a congregation, we have already shared our commitment to welcoming families with children of all ages into our worship service with joy! So today, I would like to speak directly to

parents and children! I have a few tips that I hope will make Sunday worship a joy filled and precious time for all.

When my daughter was born, I began reassessing what church would look like for us now, with a little one in our arms. While I had a wonderful example of worshiping as a family from my parents, I found myself reflecting on what had made worship successful for my siblings and I. Here are my tips for parents:

- Sit toward the front of the church. Children like to see what it going on and sitting near the front enables them to truly participate in worship.
- Pick up a children's bulleting for your child! We have been passing out children's bulletins for several months and encourage you to use this resource each week. Each week, we try to match some portion of the scripture or sermon theme to the children's bulletins. Check them out!
- Pack a special bag just for church! Include activities, books, coloring books/sheets, etc. that are only used for quiet time in the church service. I have found it helpful to pack a small children's Bible or Bible story coloring book. Every couple of months, switch out activities and surprise your child with something they haven't experienced yet.
- Encourage your child to express in drawing or writing what they see and hear in the worship service. If your child is school age, encourage them to take notes about their worship experience. We are currently providing note taking sheets for older children that make jotting down their thoughts easy!
- Draw with your child. While this may be distracting for some, for others, committing their worship experience to paper with a quick sketch may help to focus their minds and hearts.
- Encourage even the smallest children to participate. Encourage them to stand and sing the hymns (when we are safely able to sing together once again!), to sit quietly or even kneel for prayer if that is appropriate, or to join in with any congregational responses such as the Lord's Prayer.
- Remember, you and your child(ren) are loved and accepted here in our worship space! Jesus himself welcomed children encouraged the mothers of his day to bring their little ones to Him. I pray each child and parent feels loved and welcome each and every week as we worship together.

Parents, please know that I will be watching for you and keeping you in my prayers as we try a new model of worshiping together. Please do not hesitate to let me know how I can better serve you and your children!
