 to be ready community to receive. The Bible tells us "to show hospitality to strangers" for you never know when someone might just be bearing a message from God (Hebrews 13:2). As followers

of Christ, we are called to move through life with open eyes, open ears, and an open heart. Often this means giving a bit of time to the seemingly random.

Last week I received a letter from Kawkawlin Community Church. Kawkawlin township is a small farming community in Michigan. The church is celebrating their 100th anniversary and decided to send letters to 100 different churches. Their stated purpose was to tell others about how God blessed and sustained their church. Their mailing also included a short questionnaire with a hope that recipients would share how God has blessed their church. In this day and age it is easy to wonder if this is a scam or a surreptitious way of soliciting donations. Yet the letter did not indicate any need and the questionnaire primarily sought general information that is readily accessible online. However, there was one part of the form that felt a bit more personal.

"Describe your church in three words."

Through a small church I have never heard of that gathers over 4,000 miles away, the Holy Spirit invited me to pause and reflect on who we are as a church. I prayerfully reflected on how I experience this 'ohana of faith. I reflected on how I describe our church to others. Soon, I began to consider variations on their question. I thought about how I would answer the question if it said:

 - Describe how you support your church in three words
 - Share three hopes you have for your church

Every year we gather for our Annual Meeting. At the Annual Meeting we approve the minutes, elect new Councilmembers and hear reports. The business matters of the church are important but the core purpose is the reaffirmation of our identity. The Annual Meeting should provide a long enough pause for us to remember three things:

- 1. What has God done in, with, and through us?
- 2. Who we are now?
- 3. Where are we going; are we following God's lead?

Maybe these are the kinds of questions that the Kawkawlin Community Church is trying to answer for themselves. Their letter certainly seems to speak to these three questions. Perhaps, through their letter, God is calling us to spend time prayerfully considering these three questions. The daily tasks of life can take the day right out from under our nose. It is a gift to take the time to remember that God has provided for us and we are known and blessed, called and empowered.

May we begin this new church year rooted in God's love, clear about our identity, and ready to bear good fruit that blesses Honolulu and beyond.

feet worked to hehi (stomp) the overgrown honohono grass that covered the lo'i. Our hana (task) was to push down the bed of grass which would become nutrients when mixed with the water and earth beneath, leaving us kneedeep in mud. It was more tiring than expected, but we saw our surroundings transform before our eyes as we tilled the taro patch to make way for the growth of something new. While we worked together to prepare the area, we exchanged smiles and words of encouragement, struck up friendly conversations with people we had just met.

This was part of a spring break activity in which we joined other faith groups to mālama 'āina at a small organic farm in the 'ili (small land section) of Ka'ōnohi in the ahupua'a (land division) of Kalauao (commonly known as "Pearlridge") in the moku (district) of 'Ewa on the mokupuni (island) of O'ahu. For many in our group, it was a new experience. For some, it reminded them of "back home" in Pohnpei. For all, it was a memorable time of connecting with the land and each other, deepening our relationship with our Creator.

Youth participant Charlotte Neemia shares, "The day was an eye opener and great way to spend my free time. As tiring as it was, the view was all worth it. The field we went to was a place I often pass by and I didn't think much of it before. It was an eye opener to see how much hard work it took to prepare one little patch. It was a fun experience and I was able to bond with other young people my age which I sometimes have trouble with even though I may seem sociable. The view of our hard work was a great sight to see and the highlight of the whole day was when a team of people cleared out a long, old pipe that was found buried in the patch. Second highlight was when we gathered in a circle just so naturally, it still gives me warm feelings!"
