Rev. Brandon Durán, Acting Senior Minister

I sometimes hide when the extended family gathers together for a meal. There is always that moment right before we eat when everyone is looking

for someone to pray. As a pastor, I know they are scanning the room for me. It is easy to ask the pastor to pray. Pastors studied prayer in school and practice prayer as a regular part of their job. Pastors should be "good" at prayer. Yet, I wonder what we miss when we always ask

the pastor to pray. I like to hide at the moment of prayer because I want to hear someone else open their heart to God.

In September, we celebrate Laity Sunday. On Laity Sunday, members of the church welcome us into sacred space, lead the prayers, give the sermon, and call

us to Holy Communion. We hear the hearts of the congregation as church members dare to be vulnerable and demonstrate trust in one another and in God. This cherished tradition is a beautiful way of leaning into the "priesthood of all believers."

I have heard that many years ago some ministers would treat Laity Sunday like a day off. They would skip the Sunday service because the congregants had it covered. While I appreciate the confidence those ministers demonstrated in the congregation, I cannot help but feel like they missed out. It is inspiring to see others exercise their faith. On Laity Sunday we discover spiritual gifts we might not have known about and we witness people grow in faith right before our eyes.

As a minister, I believe it is my ultimate goal to train the congregation to be ministers. I want to hear members lead the prayer before a meal or share a spiritual reflection before a meeting. ^[1] I want church members to preach in word and deed. I want the congregation to invite the city to the table of Christ. Central Union lives into its congregational identity in a number of ways throughout the week. But once a year we get to witness something special. On Laity Sunday the Holy Spirit will speak through church members to energize the congregation to bless Honolulu and the world.

"I want the congregation to invite the city to the table of Christ." In the Gospel of John, Jesus gathers with his followers in the upper room. There he washes their feet and reminds them to love one another. He says to them, "Very truly I tell you, whoever believes in me will do the works I have been doing, and they will do even greater things than these, because I am going to the Father" (John 4:12). This promise to do

"even greater things" than Jesus may seem puzzling or daunting. However, the verse is connected to the promised Holy Spirit that will rest upon them. It is Jesus' way of saying, "Do not worry. The Holy Spirit is with you. You can love as I have. You've got this."

Council Talking Points

Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved. (Acts 2:46-47)

A lot has been said of late about church growth and the fact that the size of many church congregations here in Hawai'i and on the mainland are declining. A church that does not bring in new members at least equal to departing members over time is on a trajectory that will lead to the end of that church. Too often, churches that are trying to grow their membership pin their hopes on hiring a charismatic minister expecting that he or she is all that is needed to reverse the course of declining membership and to bring new vitality to a lethargic church. While such a minister can do much to inspire a congregation. without the active participation of the congregation members in revitalizing the church, the new minister will not "succeed" and some members will conclude they just don't have the right minister. Have you ever wondered why the early Church (in the time of the Apostles) grew so rapidly? It certainly was not because of beautiful buildings in which to worship (they had none) or because of programs appealing to those with special interests (there were none). In the Book of Acts, we learn that the early Church attracted people because they witnessed expressions of God's power at work, they saw the Holy Spirit uniting people and moving them to acts of love and generosity, and they saw people filled with grace who cared for each other and who were unafraid to proclaim the gospel boldly. It was the acts of these early Church members, witnessed by the people around them, that caused the Church to grow rapidly.



Central Union's

search for a settled senior minister has been underway for many months now. Our Senior Minister Search Committee ("SMSC") has been hard at work preparing the church profile and other materials needed to commence advertising for a settled senior minister and then to assess applications and conduct interviews of the more promising candidates. A substantial portion of our monthly Council meeting for August was devoted to working with certain members of the SMSC on finalizing essential elements of Central Union's advertisement. Because of the diligent work of its members, the SMSC currently remains on track to complete the candidate screening process and recommend a candidate for Council and congregation consideration by the end of 2022 or the beginning of 2023. As we get closer to the time when we will welcome a new settled senior minister, let us not lose sight of the fact that his or her success will depend on how our actions, as individual members and as a congregation, support his or her efforts to grow and revitalize Central Union Church.

Highlights from our August Council meeting:

Central Union Preschool. The faculty and staff of Central Union Preschool ("CUPS") returned to campus on August 29 for the new school year. Updated COVID health and safety guidelines from the Department of Human Services are being implemented. **Treasurer's Report.** Church Treasurer, David Yee, reported that the Accounting Department has continued to work hard to update the Church's financials, and that updates to the Church's financials have now been completed through June 2022.



Weeks were spent collecting curriculum, volunteers, and supplies and during the weeks of July 25-29 and August 1-5, we ran back-to-back week-long events.



First, we partnered with Church of the Crossroads to present **Vacation Bible School** for families of both churches. This

is the first time in several years that CUC has held Vacation Bible School and though the week's activities were not held on our campus, we had several families participate. Our theme was "Who Do You Say I Am? Investigating the Mystery of Jesus" and our junior detectives solved mysteries each week to better understand who Jesus is and how much God loves us! This exciting program also focused on sharing what we have learned about Jesus and His mission of love with those around us through acts of compassion for our families, church 'ohana, and larger community.

Next, Children's Ministry held our 2nd annual **Compassion Camp** from August 1-5 for our Central Union Church Preschool families. With a group of

20 children, our keiki ranged from 3-11 years of age! We once again utilized our "Who Do You Say I Am?" curriculum where we solved mysteries together as we learned to share our compassion with those around us.



Following Compassion Camp, we held our annual Backpack Blessing. For the last two years, this has been a drive-through event and we were excited to be able to once again hold our **Backpack Blessing** during worship. Also on Sunday, August 7th, we held our End-of-Summer/Back-to-School event between the 9:00 and 11:00 services. Shrieks of delight filled the air as our keiki splashed in the water of the CUPS lawn sprinklers and enjoyed popsicles afterward.



Aloha Sunday - September 18

Central Union Church has a long tradition of hosting the Royal Court during Aloha Week in Hawai'i. For the community at large (and the Hawaiian community in particular), it is a statement that Central Union is highly supportive of Hawaiian culture. For our own congregation, it is a reminder of the heritage of our land, and its strong Christian foundation.



This year's Aloha Festival celebrates Aloha 'Āina: Love of the Land. The foundation of Aloha 'Āina is a reverence for the 'āina (land) as a venerated ancestor. Subsequently, we collectively have kuleana (responsibility) to care for the land from whom we receive nourishment. 'Aina literally means 'that which feeds,' or 'that which provides sustenance,' and includes all of nature. The more we care for the land now, the greater care the land will have for our descendants. This same love for the land exists throughout the world and is an affirmation of our humanity. As we celebrate our love for these islands we call home, we invite you to Aloha 'Aina in your part of our world community. E Aloha 'Āina Pū Kākou! Let's all get active in caring for the land!

Give Aloha in September!

During September, Central Union Church participates in Foodland's Give Aloha program! Every year, Foodland, Sac 'n Save, and Western Union combine to donate money to the charities that are important to their customers in Hawai'i. For each dollar given, Foodland and the Western Union Foundation will match a portion of that donation, up to a total of \$250,000 for all organizations combined. Donor names will be confidential and will not be released.

You can pay your September pledge, or donate up to a

cumulative total of \$249 (per person, per organization). Go to Foodland with your Maika'i card [free at any Foodland service counter] and go to any cash register to pay your donation with cash/check/ credit card, naming Central Union Church - #78511 or Central Union Preschool - #78270 as a recipient. You will receive two receipts with your name, Central Union Church's (or Preschool's) name, and the donation amount on them. Keep one for your records and turn one into the church office by mail, or in the collection plate, so you will get credit on your giving statement.
