# We, Too, Are Bearers of Light

Our transition from the Christmas season is ebbing. During this transition in the life of the church, we often read and hear words from

the first chapter of John's gospel: the Light has come! We have celebrated, and are reminded to continue to celebrate, its presence among us.

As Pastor Mary led us in our celebration of Epiphany a few weeks ago, we were reminded that a light the magi were willing to follow is what guided them to the Christ child. Now, as we begin to follow Jesus' first steps into his ministry, we are reminded that we, too, are bearers of light. Jesus tells his followers to not hide their light, whether it be under a basket, under a bed, or in a secret place...or in a myriad of other ways we conjure up to keep it hid. As the light of God is reflected in and through us, we can live with hopeful anticipation of what the brilliance of that light can mean for 2023.

The Gospel of John also informs our understanding of the 'wattage' of that light:

"From his [Jesus'] fullness we have all received, grace upon grace" (John 1:16). Grace is a source of illumination for our souls as we experience the lingering darkness of the pandemic, the numerous transitions within Central Union Church, and the personal challenges we encounter. Grace is a gift. It is a gift without discrimination. A gift without restriction. A gift that needs expression. A gift that keeps on giving. A gift which multiplies when shared. As we allow the gift of grace to infiltrate the dark crevices in our lives, it will illuminate the way forward for each of us individually and as a church community.

Our recent darkened journeys may have drained us, possibly to the point of emptiness and exhaustion. We crave light for our paths. We crave grace. A willingness to acknowledge the gift of grace for ourselves, and encourage one another in the giving and receiving of it, will open us to the possibilities that lie ahead for Central Union Church to reflect the light of God within us. In doing so, we will magnify the brilliance of God's presence, sustained by the overflowing fullness of Christ.

As the light of God is reflected in and through us, we can live with hopeful anticipation of what the brilliance of that light can mean for 2023.

# Message from our Church Council Chair

"When he was at the table with them, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and began to give it to them. Then their eyes were opened and they recognized him, and he disappeared from their sight. They asked each other, 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?" (Luke 24:30-32)

A big mahalo to all who attended (in person, via Zoom, or via telephone) the Annual Budget Meeting and Vision Team Presentation this past Sunday, January 29, 2023. It was wonderful to see so many of you make time to participate in the life of Central Union Church. We learned of the challenges we face, but we also learned that, collectively, we have the ability and the resources to meet those challenges so long as we seek to walk faithfully with God. On Sunday, we started on our road to Emmaus—it is a "road trip" we invite the entire congregation to join.



If you have ever gone on a road trip, you know it is a journey of discovery regardless of whether you are traveling a thousand miles on the mainland or just a trip around the island of O'ahu. No matter how well you plan your trip before leaving, something new or unexpected inevitably arises before you get to your destination that requires you and your fellow travelers to make choices about how to proceed. Sometimes you will agree and sometimes you will not, but it is important to engage all in the discussion so that whatever the group decides, each person will feel they have been heard and that they can live with the decision even if it was not their

choice. Sometimes the most exciting discoveries on a road trip are not the new sites and places you visit but what you learn and discover about yourself.

One of my favorite thought pieces comes from the Greek philosopher Heraclitus who said, "No man ever steps in the same river twice, for it is not the same river and he is not the same man." I think most of us will agree we are not the same person we were thirty years ago, or ten years ago, or even one year ago. Hopefully, we have grown and are continuing to grow both spiritually and emotionally with the march of time. Similarly, I think most of us will agree the "world" in which we live is also changing around us - it is not the same world we knew as a child, or as an adult or in our later years. And just as we all are changing on a personal level, while at the same time living in an ever-changing world, so, too, is Central Union Church. Despite its rich and treasured history, we know that Central Union Church is not the same church it was forty years ago, or twenty years ago, or even just before the pandemic. Nor should it be the same; instead, it needs to be a church for the world in which it exists now and for the world that is to come. It needs to be a church that can speak to the people as the people change. To have such a church, we need to accept that change is happening within us and all around us.
