News from the April 27th Council Meeting

Aloha, Central Union Church! Allow me to share some highlights from our last Council meeting for the Council Year 2022-2023 held on April 27, 2023.

Aloha to Council Members Sam Failla and Mary Calantoc. Since it was our last Council meeting for the Council Year, we bid aloha to Sam Failla, whose term has ended, and to Mary Calantoc, who will be relocating to the mainland. We thanked them for their many contributions to the Council and for their service to Central Union Church. Although they will be missed on the Council, we know Sam will continue his service on various church committees, and Mary will stay in touch with us from the mainland.

Recovery of Insurance Deductible. The Council thanked Miguel Asuncion for his diligent efforts in recovering the \$10,000 deductible paid by CUC under its insurance policy in connection with the damage to our Windward campus back in August 2022 caused by an accident involving a Honolulu police car. Fortunately, no one was hurt in the accident.

Personnel and Pastoral Relations Committee.

Nathan Wong, chairperson of the Personnel and Pastoral Relations Committee (PPRC), reported that a candidate who was interviewed for the vacant Comptroller position has been offered the job. More information will be shared in an upcoming edition of *The Spire* and *CU Weekly*!

Central Union Preschool. Final preparations for the upcoming "Dazzle" fundraiser were discussed by Preschool Director, Veronique Braithwaite, and all were encouraged to attend. (Chair's note: the "Dazzle" fundraiser was held on Friday, April 29, 2023, the day after our Council meeting, in Atherton Courtyard, the Preschool campus, and the Parish Hall. It was a fabulous and well-attended event under a beautiful, clear night sky, with lots of delicious food. Many thanks to Veronique, the Dazzle committee, and staff members for making it a successful event.)

Step Up, Step Out Campaign. Pastor Mary, Pastor Dave, Greg Sato, and Kristen Young have been working on a "Step Up, Step Out" campaign that seeks to generate greater participation from CUC members in the life of our church. A kickoff event is being planned for May 11, 2023, for ministry and financial leaders.

Pastor Dave. It was announced that although Pastor Dave Smazik and his wife Ann will be returning to the mainland on May 8, 2023, Pastor Dave will continue to assist Pastor Mary and serve Central Union Church on a remote, part-time basis for the next few months while the Senior Minister Search Committee continues to work toward identifying the Senior Minister candidate that it will recommend to the Church Council. Although it is not time to say aloha for good to Pastor Dave just yet, the Council thanked him for his time among us.

Annual Congregational Meeting. The Council discussed preparations for the Annual Meeting of our Congregation to be held on Sunday, May 21, 2023, in the Parish Hall at 11 AM, for the purpose of approving the Minutes of the May 1, 2022 Annual Meeting, the January 29, 2023 Annual Budget Meeting, and the March 5, 2023 Special Meeting; electing new members and officers of the Council; receiving reports from the Chair of the Council, the Treasurer of the Council, and our Minister of Congregational Life and Care; and voting on an Amendment to Bylaws Section 3.2 to change the date by which the Annual Budget Meeting must be held each year from "on or before the last day of January" to "on or before the last day of August." Committee and ministry chairs were also reminded to complete their annual reports which will be compiled into the larger CUC Annual Report.

I look forward to seeing everyone (either in person or via Zoom) at our Annual Congregational Meeting. Mahalo! —Carl


Open for God's Business

Members of the CUC Buildings and Grounds Committee felt that the old signs facing outward along Beretania and Punahou Streets gave a poor impression to the thousands of cars that drive past our beloved Central Union Church campus daily. The old, worn-out signs gave passersby the impression that we were not open for God's business.

Committee members found a local company that could replace and upgrade the signs in their existing style. Timed LED lights were added to the borders of the signs, new matching letters and messages were placed on the new signboards behind the quarter-inch thick industrial-grade sunblock plexiglass. The existing black metal support frames were sanded, steel brushed, and painted with two coats of black gloss metal paint.

These new signs improve the curb appeal and shout, "CUC is open for God's business," to those who pass by!
