It was almost a year ago that Ann and I were moving from Indiana to suburban Chicago, Illinois. Moving into a new area, a new city, would certainly be a major transition but we were

also transitioning from full-time pastoral ministry into retirement. We were not certain what retirement would bring but certainly anticipated a very different rhythm to our lives. One that perhaps would be a bit more predictable, different from the daily commitment of ministering in and alongside a large faith community.

I have previously shared that it was only about one hour into that transitional drive down the interstate that I received a call from Pastor Mary about a short-term opportunity at Central Union. Given the number of unknowns we had been anticipating and the rhythmic variations already playing in our heads, we were not quite prepared for the major change of cadence yet to come! While writing these words, we are

anticipating another break in rhythm as I end my time as a ministry assistant with Central Union. However, I am certain that the tempo of our lives will forever be affected because of our time in ministry with the members and staff of CUC. The hospitality, graciousness, and commitment that we experienced has left an indelible mark in our hearts and minds. We are grateful that we leaned into this opportunity during a time of transition.

Central Union Church has been in a period of transition for weeks, months, and even years, to the point that many of you may be experiencing transition fatigue. Navigating a pandemic in the midst of this transition was depleting in every sense of the word. I imagine there is a pervasive desire for the return of a nice, calm, previously known rhythm with the arrival of a new senior pastor. To suggest anything different might strike a sensitive chord among a congregation nearing exhaustion.

However, growth occurs at the point of transition. It becomes the rhythm of our souls, of life. It is the rhythm of creation. The arrival of Pastor Rushan is

only a few weeks away and provides opportunity to lean into this transition. Jesus' reference to seeds in the parables speak to growth possible from the tiniest amount. Leaning into the process of what God is unfolding in and through this transition, even with energy that may only be the size of a mustard seed, draws the congregation into the rhythm of the creative process, into growth.

Update from Council

Aloha Central Union Church!

In the **BC** era ("**Before COVID**"), it was common for the Council to hold a retreat in June, shortly

after a new Council was elected at the Annual Member Meeting in May. Although we decided to reinstate the Council retreat this year, we had to push it back to July due to the number of activities in June related to the visit by our Senior Minister candidate, Pastor Rushan Sinnaduray and his family, and the eventual calling of Pastor Rushan to be our new Senior Minister. On Saturday, July 29,

2023, the Council held its first retreat in years. Its purpose was three-fold: first, to give the Council an opportunity to step back and look at what we do from a wider lens so we can better assess the



varying needs of Central Union Church and establish priorities that will enable our work to be more focused and effective; second, to give new and continuing Council members the opportunity to get to know the people they are journeying with in this place and at this time and who they will be working with for the next year or so; and third, to learn or be reminded of Council protocols and policies, and to receive their ministry and committee liaison designations and their projects assignments. Despite the fact that some Council members were unable to attend the retreat due to illness, work demands, and conflicting travel schedules, it was a worthwhile exercise and it served to energize the Council for the work ahead.

Given the proximity of the retreat to our monthly Council meeting for July (scheduled for Thursday, July 27, 2023), it was decided to hold our monthly Council meeting on Saturday morning, immediately before our retreat. Allow me to share some news from our July Council meeting:

Given the start of our new fiscal year on August 1, 2023, CUC Treasurer, David Yee, assisted by Comptroller, Angie Barboza, presented the Council with the proposed budget for the fiscal year from August 1, 2023, through July 31, 2024, inclusive. The proposed budget, subject to minor adjustments once further information becomes available, was approved by the Council for presentation to the Congregation for consideration

and approval at the upcoming Annual Budget Meeting scheduled for Sunday, August 27, 2023. (Note that the proposed budget will be made available to CUC Members for review in advance of the Annual Budget Meeting.) As a reminder, the prior budget approved by the Congregation earlier this year (on January 29, 2023), was for the 7-month "stub" fiscal year that began on January 1, 2023 and ended on July 31, 2023. This was due to the recent alignment of our Church fiscal year with the Preschool fiscal year. As David Yee explained previously, with the start of the new fiscal year on August 1, 2023, we will be back to a full 12-month fiscal year.

 Given the recent alignment of the Annual Budget Meeting with CUC's fiscal year, the Council considered whether we also should align the Annual Membership Meeting with the Annual Budget Meeting. Currently, our Bylaws require (1) before the end of August, an Annual Budget Meeting for CUC Members to review and approve the budget for the fiscal year, and (2) before the end of May, an Annual Membership Meeting for CUC Members to elect Council members who are to be elected by CUC Membership and transacting such other business as may properly come before the meeting. After discussion, the Council concluded it would be beneficial to combine the Annual Membership Meeting and the Annual Budget Meeting into a single meeting to be held on or before the last day of September of each year for the purposes of considering and approving the budget for the fiscal year, electing Council members who are to be elected by CUC Membership, and transacting such other business as may properly come before the meeting. The Council believes this change, which will allow for all routine, annual business of CUC to be addressed in a single meeting, is a more comprehensive and efficient way for CUC Members to exercise their reserved rights under our Bylaws. Consequently, the Council will be presenting a proposed Bylaws Amendment to CUC Members for consideration and approval at the Annual Budget Meeting that combines the Annual Membership Meeting and the Annual Budget Meeting into a single meeting as aforesaid. The proposed Bylaws Amendment will be made available to CUC Members for review in advance of the Annual Budget Meeting.

- The Real Estate Committee continues to explore development options and has commenced initial, preliminary discussions with possible development partners. To assist in managing the strategic communications and community outreach functions which will be essential to the success of our development project, the Real Estate Committee has engaged the services of DTL (pronounced "detail"), a company with a proven track record in facilitating high-profile development projects. Before the end of the year, the Real Estate Committee will provide a progress report to the Congregation.
- Pastor Rushan and his family have been busy arranging for their journey to Honolulu. Movers have been scheduled to pack and ship their

belongings and their flight to Honolulu has been booked. They arrive on Friday, September 8, 2023. (We still anticipate that Pastor Rushan's first Sunday in the pulpit will be the last Sunday in September.) Plans are underway to ensure Pastor Rushan and his family receive a warm welcome and to facilitate a smooth transition to their new home. 
A New Partnership

Central Union's Community Ministry is working to support the houseless in our community by partnering with River of Life Mission. Last year, River of Life changed their model of feeding the homeless in a central location by instituting "hubs" around the island that would provide meals and other supportive services.



Starting on June 12th, on each Monday evening, volunteers from River of Life set up on the corner of Punahou and Beretania streets to hand out meals and engage with the community. Through building relationships, their intent is to help people on their journey out of homelessness and into a more stable life. Meal distribution is limited to 50 meals served, so that no single location is overwhelmed. Following the distribution, the River of Life volunteers clean and clear the site.



This model, which has been very successful so far, was highlighted in an article entitled "Helping the Homeless" in the Honolulu Star-Advertiser on April 18, 2023. In the article, Mayor Rick Blangiardi acknowledged the efforts addressed through this new model. "The fact is that so many of these people need support," he said. "They need wrap-around services. ... I support River of Life and their effort to promote their ministry and do the good work that they do."

Partnering and sharing in this way allows our church to further be a blessing to our community.

On August 13, we'll celebrate Keiki Sunday with a Bible Presentation, Backpack Blessing, water play, and Pūpū Potluck for ALL!










Youth Hele On to Kauaʻi





