What I hope is that through our week-by-week gathering in worship, through our committee meetings, through our church programs and activities, and through our life together, we may begin to discover clues about how to be people filled with God's light, love and compassion.

I hope that sense of God, which we experience through our worship, our openness to God's word in scripture, our sharing of communion, and our care for one another, gives us resources for living, and living compassionately, lovingly, creatively and humanly, in a world that often seems to have lost its capacity for compassion, love, creativity and humanity.

I want to offer a word for you to engage with and reflect on this month. It is a particularly important word throughout scripture and is central to our experience and understanding of the Christmas story. The particular word is LIGHT. During January, I will be preaching about the way that God's light shines through all of us shaping our lives and our living in the communities of our daily lives.

Blessings for a wonderful year ahead.

# Message from Our Church Council Chair

Aloha Central Union Church!

As Sunday gave way to Monday this past week, we celebrated the start of a new

year. And while the transition from Sunday to Monday had already happened 51 times before in 2023, we imbued this 52nd time with much more meaning because this time it was a transition from the old (2023) to the new (2024). We look at the beginning of each new year as an opportunity – not just a time of transition but, more importantly, a time of transformation. Many people desire a fresh start and relish the opportunity to change certain aspects of their

lives. The expression "out with the old and in with the new" is, for many, paraphrased as "get rid of all the old, bad habits and start again with new, good habits." It's like hitting the "restart" button on our lives (just make sure you "save" all the good things).

I believe this desire to change, to become better

versions of ourselves, is strong for many people. As Christians, however, the desire to change arises from a more compelling subtext: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!" [2 Corinthians 5:17]. So, when we at Central Union Church say, "We Engage and Embrace ALL as we seek to Embody Christ". our seeking to embody Christ reflects not just a desire to change but, on a deeper level, a desire to become a new creation - to change the very way in which we think and act and live. Despite knowing how difficult it can be to change (and even more so to become a new creation), we continue to try and are encouraged by the words of Jesus, "Behold, I am making all things new" [Revelation 21:5], from which we find the hope we need as we seek to transform our lives.

The beginning of 2024 also finds the Church

Council looking forward to the opportunities presented by a new year - opportunities to move existing projects closer to completion and opportunities to address new projects and challenges. Some of the important existing projects include (i) the ongoing assessment (by a joint working group of staff and Council members) of the actions needed to improve security at our two campuses, (ii) efforts to seek additional grant money to address various Church projects and needs, (iii) the strategic review of the Church's endowment and the consideration of actions needed to ensure management of our endowment that optimizes returns within acceptable risk parameters, (iv) evaluation and revision of the Church's personnel handbooks, and (v) the Real Estate

Committee's continuation of meetings with, and evaluations of, potential development partners for the possible development of portions of the Honolulu campus. More information on the foregoing and other Council matters will be forthcoming after the monthly Council meeting at the end of January.

So, what does God have in store for you and for Central Union Church as we start 2024? Thanks to your generosity, 2023's White Gifts project was again a great success! Together we were able to provide over 1,000 gifts to various social service agencies in our island community. Recipients included people of all ages, from infants through kūpuna and every age in between. Many are houseless, in shelters or transition situations, shut-in, or recent immigrants. Some of the agencies we partner with include PACT (Parents and Children Together), Youth Outreach, Keauhou Shelter, Hale Kipa, HUGS, UCC Transition House, Hawaii Meals on Wheels, Fernhurst, and others. Each year, we contact the agencies to find out their current needs (these change every year), the demographics of their clientele, and the number of gifts needed. Armed with this

information, shopping begins. This year, the most requested items were micro-fleece blankets, journals, socks, various hygiene items, plush toys, HotWheels, books for young children, McDonald's gift cards, and air beds (for Keauhou Shelter).

Our White Gifts project blesses the most vulnerable and needy in our community. The agencies all expressed deep gratitude for the gifts we offered, especially knowing that the gifts were exactly what was needed and requested.

Thank you all for your generosity and kind hearts. You have brought Christmas joy to so many who would not have received any gift. May this White Gifts tradition continue for generations to come! May God bless you all.

# Messiah i ka 'Ōlelo Hawai'i


