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Journeying as an Easter People

We continue our journey through Lent towards Easter. We, the Church, are an Easter people. The Easter event is at the center of who we are and

what we believe.

So, what does it mean to be an Easter People? In the Acts of the Apostles, we're told that the first Christian congregation, meeting in Jerusalem, guided by the Apostles and in the shadowed light of the first Easter "gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ." What's interesting is that they gave their testimony in deeds rather than words. They may not have had all the answers as to the how, what or whether of a bodily resurrection. They knew that belief in the resurrection of Jesus was a way of life before it was ever summarized in churchly creeds.

Jesus is notable for the way he lived within the inclusive hospitality of God, his care for the outcast and the needy, his practice and teaching on prayer and his warnings about the power and perils of possessions. The message of Jesus was lived out within groups of real and fragile people exploring together what it might mean for them to live within the love of God as Jesus did.

There are many in our world today who seek to follow Jesus without the complications and burdens of church life. Of course, you can be a person of faith without the church, but it's difficult to see how anyone could be a serious follower of Jesus Christ without some sort of community seeking to express the Jesus alternative through their life together. Qualities like forgiveness, generosity, love, hospitality and healing are fine sounding but unless they're expressed in the life of a community, they remain words without any genuine meaning. They're all communal activities. They're the glue that holds any decent and life-enhancing community together.

The distinctive Protestant form of Christian community is the congregation. So, Central Union Church is our school for Christian living, our

monastery, and our community of formation, sharing, prayer and support. This is the place and the people where we ask what it means to live within the resurrection story and what it means to be a Christian community reflecting the way of Jesus Christ. Like the early church, we give testimony to the resurrection through our life together, through our pleasure in each other's company, in our desire to grow in faith, in our confidence that we're together on the journey of life and faith, that we care and pray for one another and that together we're exploring what it means to embody the way of Jesus in a needy world. It's the setting where we can explore together what the big Christian words of hospitality, sharing, love, forgiveness, generosity, peace, grace, might mean for us and the community in which we live.

Who and what we are as a church 'ohana is all part of our ongoing testimony to the resurrection and our embodiment of the way of Jesus. So, this Easter, no matter who you are and where you are on your journey of life and of faith, I invite you to recommit to sharing your journey of faith with us here at Central Union Church, and find a home for your Spirit here in this place, here, in this community.

With unwavering enthusiasm and energy, Women's League members went to work to ensure the event would be successful. Entertainment was arranged and confirmed; multiple forms of publicity (announcements, flyers, banners, e-blast, Spire, etc.) were utilized to get the word out; ongoing ticket sales took place over several weeks; a diverse menu was created and food was ordered; displays celebrating Central Union Church history and ministries were envisioned and then developed; a

Church Council Sponsors Resolution

In February, a team of writers from within the Hawai'i Conference United Church of Christ approached Central Union Church's (CUC) Council to sponsor a Resolution of Witness, titled "A Call to Education and Action Regarding the Crisis in Gaza." A Resolution of Witness makes a moral and theological statement about a pressing issue and often contains a call to action for churches and members. In order to be considered by the larger body of the Conference at the 'Aha Pae'āina, a Resolution of Witness must be sponsored by one or more churches from the Conference.

The writing team was led by CUC member Reem Bassous, who presented the resolution to our Council. The resolution calls on Conference churches to do three things: a) to publicly pray and call for an immediate and permanent ceasefire in Gaza and Palestine;

b) to call for an end to the blockades of humanitarian aid preventing critical food and medical supplies from

getting into Gaza; and c) to commit to educating ourselves about the history and current conflict in Palestine and Israel.

After thoughtful discussion and a couple minor modifications, our Council unanimously voted to sponsor this Resolution of Witness, allowing the resolution to come before the 'Aha Pae'āina for discussion in June. We have since been joined by five of our sister churches, who have also voted to sponsor the resolution.

CU Youth Talk Conflict

Over the past few weeks, the youth have been discussing conflict – where it comes from, how we deal with it, and what it looks like to resolve it well. We discussed the inevitability of conflict and, since it is bound to happen, the importance of working together to resolve it. One week we highlighted communication styles and breakdowns as a main cause of conflict. We did an activity to illustrate how easily we can misinterpret what someone else is saying. In our activity, one person drew a picture on a paper plate and described what they were doing step by step. The rest of us drew on our own paper plates following the instructions of the original artist. The room erupted in laughter when we saw the original drawing next to our interpretations (pictured here). This happens so often in our communication - and it is important to ask questions to clarify what the other person means instead of jumping to conclusions and assuming we know the other person's intent. In a world that is guick to speak and slow to listen, my hope is that we will do the opposite and our conflicts will be resolved well.




