# Pastor's Page: "Imagine Together"

Friends.

I was reading an article recently about a certain kind

of bacteria that has learned to live forever. According to the story, these single-celled creatures survive through periods of severe drought, heat, or cold by reshuffling their chemical processes. They put up molecular gates around their most important parts gates for which "the only key is the return of favorable conditions". It seems that bacteria that shut themselves down and close themselves off this way can live for decades. centuries, or possibly longer.

In so many ways that is a little like what we do in the Christian Church when the environment and context we find ourselves in becomes unfavorable: we put up hard walls around the core of faith, worship, and church life and prepare to enter into a state of hibernation. I mean, just look around. The wider culture has become less favorable ground for growth. Religious pluralism is a reality now in a way

that it wasn't fifty years ago. Jobs, families, and politics are all changing. The ethnic makeup of our communities is different than it was when our churches and denominations were growing and flourishing. One appealing answer is to pull back, hoard our limited resources and maintain the status quo until things around us change.

The problem is that I don't think that this is a faithful response. It's just not possible to shut down and wait. The church is, as St. Paul tells us, a body with many parts, not a single-celled organism. Bodies are always changing along with their world. They're connected to the world

outside. We have to trust that God is at work within us as well as around us, and that what God is doing may feel unexpected, uncomfortable and a little frightening at times.

In October we will begin our annual Stewardship Campaign. The theme of our campaign this year is "Imagine Together". During October, our worship and sermons will challenge us to begin dreaming and imagining the future for this vital community of faith and will also challenge us to discern ways in which each and every one of us can use our time, talent, and treasure to help us renew, revitalize and re-energize Central Union Church. I am also looking forward to beginning the process of sharing my thoughts for a vision and

strategic plan for our church

as we look to the future. I am so excited to embark on this journey of imagining our future together with each of you. This is an exciting time to be a part of Central Union Church as we work together to discern God's dream for this part of the body of Christ in this time and place.

During October and over

the next 12-18 months, we will be asking ourselves what it means to be open to the movement of God's

Spirit, and asking ourselves

to imagine what that will mean for us as we travel into the future. Unlike the closed-down. immortal bacteria, the key to our life as a faith community is not in holding fast to what we've always done and hoarding our resources but trusting that we are held in the hands of God as we take some risks in faith, as we think creatively and as we remain open to the movement of God's Holy Spirit in and through us. Come, let us imagine together!

## Annual Member and Budget Meeting



#### Youth Contribute to a "Genki" Future







Healthy, vital, energetic – in Japanese, these qualities can be expressed by the word *genki*. Our youth voted to donate a portion of their earnings from the 2024 Punahou parking fundraiser to **The Genki Ala Wai Project**. The mission of the project is to empower students, teachers, and the community to work together to restore the ecosystem in the Ala Wai Canal by deploying 300,000 Genki Balls, specially-made mud balls containing beneficial microorganisms that help digest sludge. On Saturday, September 7, our youth group sponsored a wider community event making Genki Balls and tossing them into the canal. Since the start of the project in 2019, over 165,991 Genki Balls have been launched into the Ala Wai in an effort to make the canal safe for fishing and swimming again!


