



Pastor's Page: A Gift and A Responsibility

Dear Central Union 'ohana,

As I approach the end of my second year as your Senior Minister and as we continue to walk together in faith, I want to share some

reflections that have been stirring in my heart—especially after attending the 35th General Synod of the United Church of Christ. It was a powerful experience, one that reminded me of the sacred calling we share as a church and the unique gift of our congregational polity.

At its core, the church is called to be the living body of Christ in the world. We are called to worship, to witness, to serve, and to love. But how we live out that calling—how we make decisions, discern direction, and care for one another—is shaped by our governance. In the UCC, and here at Central Union Church, we practice a congregational polity, which means that authority resides not in a hierarchy, not in a single committee or a board, but in the gathered body of believers.

Attending General Synod 35 brought this to life in a profound way. I witnessed delegates from churches across the country—lay people and clergy alike—come together to pray, worship, debate, discern, and decide. It was messy at times, yes, but it was also beautiful. It was a living example of what it means to trust that the Holy Spirit speaks not just through a few, but through the whole body.

This model of being church has deep historical roots. It emerged during the Reformation, when believers began to question centralized authority and instead emphasized the autonomy of the local church and the priesthood of all believers. Congregationalists believed that each church, under the guidance of Christ and through the movement of the Holy Spirit, could faithfully discern its mission and ministry.

That legacy continues today. In our church, every member has a voice. We vote on our leadership, our budget, our mission priorities. We covenant together—not just to attend on Sunday morning, but to participate. This is not just a structure; it's a spiritual practice. It calls us to listen deeply, to speak truthfully, and to act faithfully.

General Synod reminded me that this way of being church is both a gift and a responsibility. It requires us to show up—not just physically, but spiritually. It challenges us to be informed, prayerful, and engaged. And it affirms that our collective discernment, grounded in love and guided by the Spirit, can lead us forward in faith.

As we continue our journey together, I pray that we embrace this calling with joy and humility. May we honor all the voices among us, seek unity in our diversity, and trust that Christ is truly present when we gather in His name.

Nearly 2,000 United Church of Christ clergy and members came together for the 35th General Synod, a week filled with worship, discussions, and decisions on important spiritual and moral issues. Our Senior Minister, Rev. Rushan Sinnaduray, served as Moderator for

this Synod. The theme for this General Synod was "Into the Deep," encouraging us to explore and embrace the depths of our faith and mission. Over several days, we listened, debated, and voted on 11 significant


resolutions that reflect our values of inclusion, compassion, and faithful witness.



Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia Thompson, our General Minister and President, gave a heartfelt State of the Church address and a powerful Sunday sermon. She asked us to honestly reflect on who we are and who we're becoming as the United Church of Christ. She

acknowledged our challenges, like shrinking numbers and financial issues, but also called us to be imaginative, innovative, and boldly engaged with our communities. We're not just managing decline; we're figuring out how to be the church in new ways.

We were inspired by Rev. Jennifer Butler, founder of Faith in Public Life, who delivered a stirring keynote. Her message was clear: Don't lose heart. We're built for this moment.



churches to break stigma and foster inclusion.

Two historic resolutions established full communion with the Evangelische Kirche in Deutschland (EKD) -the Protestant Church in Germany-and the Iglesia Evangélica Unida de Puerto Rico. These partnerships are based on shared theology, mutual respect, and global solidarity. Another important vote recognized the needs and gifts of small town and rural (STAR) churches, giving them official standing in the wider church's life and leadership.


Staying true to our justice-seeking identity, the Synod took bold stands on global and domestic human rights. Delegates called for an end to the genocide in Palestine, affirmed human rights in the Philippines, and condemned the persecution of Christians in India. Two more resolutions urged the federal government to restore full funding and autonomy to USAID and the Voice of America, recognizing their importance in global development and truthful media.

One of the most visible acts of public witness was the Church's protest against federal attacks on immigrants, migrants, and refugees—a deeply faithful expression of our call to "welcome the stranger." That <u>resolution</u> passed with strong support.

Additionally, a resolution to merge all four UCC Conferences in Pennsylvania into one unified Keystone Conference was approved, reflecting the evolving nature of church structure in response to changing needs. However, not all proposals moved forward—notably, a major change to the UCC's bylaws did not pass, leaving room for continued dialogue and discernment.

General Synod is where the Holy Spirit moves among us-not always with easy agreement, but always with faithful engagement. The Church is alive, dynamic, and committed to doing God's work in this world. Our challenge is to continue to try to live into these resolutions with courage and compassion in our local churches and communities.

Looking ahead, the 36th General Synod will be held in Cleveland, Ohio in 2028 and will include a celebration of the UCC's 70th birthday.






Back-to-School Blessings

That would not be possible without the incredible support of local outside scholarships. So, I would like to give a big MAHALO to the Kenneth O. and Doris A. "My long-term goal is to return home and start a nonprofit that supports children growing up in households affected by addiction. There are so many kids on the island facing instability and

being overlooked by systems that don't have enough resources to help. I want to be someone who shows up for them and makes them feel like they have a purpose. . . . I truly believe we can use our experiences, especially the hard ones, to create change in our communities.
