



Pastor's Page: What do you fear?

Advent is nearly upon us. On November 30, we will once

again step into the season of waiting, watching, and preparing for Christ's coming. Each year, Advent invites us to light candles against the darkness, to sing songs of promise, and to lean into the hope that God is still breaking into our world.

This year, our theme is both timely and timeless: "What Do You Fear?: Insisting on Hope This Advent."

Luke's Gospel begins the story of Jesus with a simple but weighty phrase: "In the time of Herod..."
Those words remind us that Christ was born into a world marked by fear—



oppression, economic disparity, and uncertainty. And yet, in that fearful world, angels appeared with a startling refrain: "Do not be afraid."

Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the magi all knew fear. They did not deny it, but they did not let it have the final word. They asked questions. They held fast to courage. They trusted in good news. They said, "Here I am, Lord."

We, too, live in a world where fear is real. Fear of division. Fear of loss. Fear of the unknown. Fear can paralyze us, divide us, and even be wielded as a tool of oppression. But what if, instead of letting fear rule us, we chose to name it, face it, and transform it? What if our fears became the very soil where God's hope takes root?

This Advent, we will listen closely to the angels' voices and to the cries of our own hearts. We will name the fears that haunt us, but we will not stop there. Together, we will insist on hope—the gritty, resilient hope that Christ brings. A hope that does not deny the darkness but shines all the brighter within it.

Every candle we light, every carol we sing, every prayer we lift is an act of defiance against despair. It is our way of saying: fear does not get the last word. Hope does. Christ does.

This Advent, I invite you to walk this journey

with us. Come as you are—with your questions, your fears, your longings, and your hopes. Each Sunday, as we gather in worship, light the candles of the wreath, and lift our voices in

song, we will discover together how God's good news still breaks into a fearful world. Whether you join us in person, online or in spirit, your presence matters. Together, as one church 'ohana, we will practice courage, kindle hope, and prepare room in our hearts for Christ who will be born into our world and into our hearts.

So come, beloved community. Bring your fears. Bring your questions. Bring your longing for good news. And together, let us insist on hope, trusting that the One who came into a fearful world still comes to us today with peace, joy, and love.

Council meetings are open to all Church members who wish to attend. In addition to our regular agenda, we invite members to participate in discussions inspired by Pastor Rushan's vision that our church should be centered around a Spirit-led commitment. His four essential expressions to guide our mission are:

3. Radical Hospitality 4. Living Out Faith

Despite some initial doubts about whether a retreat would happen at all this year, about 30 women—CUC members and friends—gathered for the 36th annual Central Union Church Women's Retreat at Camp Mokule'ia on October 24-26. Longtime participant Jane Nagel shared the following with the recipient of the Retreat offering: "It was a beautiful weekend of singing, telling stories, faith discussion, swimming, painting, growing closer to God and our friends and worship. We are so blessed to be able to come together for these three days of beauty with other women of different faith backgrounds and cultures. Our final activity is always a service of communion and praise. The offering we collect always goes to a charitable organization that helps women in Hawai'i." A total of \$1,025 was collected at the Women's Retreat for the the Pū'a Foundation to support their work with women in transition from incarceration. Our spirits have been renewed by our time together and we hope to carry on the tradition next year with more women!

Lighting the Way in a Time of Challenge

Earlier this month, our congregation received the news about someone in our CUC community who had been detained by Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) here in Honolulu. For many of us, it is the closest we've been to the harsh impacts of the latest U.S. immigration policies.

In a letter to the congregation, Pastor Rushan shared, "I write to you today with a heavy heart. Our dear friend and drummer in our 11 AM worship service praise team, Rogerio Araujo, was detained by Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). . . Rogerio is not only a gifted musician and artist—he is a cherished member of our church 'ohana, a man of faith and



kindness, and the beloved husband of Cheryl Bartlett, who sings alongside him in our worship band. This is a frightening and painful time for Cheryl and for all who love Rogerio. His absence is felt not only in our music, but in the spirit of our shared life. We grieve this injustice and stand in support of Cheryl as she navigates the uncertainty and emotional toll of this moment. We also recognize that Rogerio's detention is part of a broader reality—a political and immigration system that is deeply broken. Families are being separated. Citizens and long-time residents are being

system that is deeply broken. Families are being separated. Citizens and long-time residents are being detained without warning. Human dignity is too often lost in the shuffle of policy and enforcement. As people of faith, we are called to respond—not with despair, but with compassion, courage, and conviction . . . Rogerio and Cheryl are part of our family. Their pain is our pain. Their hope is our hope. And together, we will walk through this valley with faith, compassion, and the unwavering belief that love is stronger than fear."

Let us pray for Rogerio's safety and release; for Cheryl's strength and peace; for wisdom and compassion to guide

those in positions of power and authority. Let our prayers be persistent, not passive — prayers that rise like incense and move to make a difference.

Our annual White Gifts program will continue to carry out our mission of providing much-needed Christmas gifts for the social services and ministries we have faithfully partnered with for decades, so that they can offer Christmas gifts to the people they serve. The majority of White Gifts go to impoverished and disadvantaged adults and youth; some are homeless or in transition due to domestic violence, injustice, aging out of foster care, or other circumstances beyond their control. Now, more than ever, the importance of these gifts cannot be overstated.

Our revised method of collecting monetary donations has turned out to be a huge benefit for the agencies we serve as this "new" way of giving ensures that each agency receives exactly what their people need. Instead of purchasing and wrapping gifts, those who wish to participate can donate by cash or check, made payable to Central Union Church. On the memo line, write "White Gifts". You may also **donate online** through our website: centralunionchurch.org/donate.

Select "White Gifts" in the dropdown menu to designate your gift.

Submit your monetary donation anytime between now and December 19. Only monetary donations will be accepted. We cannot accept gift items.

A team of savvy shoppers will then purchase suitable gifts with the available funds. The agencies submit a gift request form so we know what their needs are. In years past we have given 1,000+ gifts shared between eight to ten agencies. All gifts will be pre-sorted according to each agency before White Gifts Sunday. Our White Gifts celebration will be held on Sunday, December 21, in one combined worship service at 10 AM in the Sanctuary.


